






club a longer time span between bridge projects in the future, and the club is already noticing that the new bridges last up to twice as long as the previous rough-cut lumber bridges that were built for years.

Along with the trail work, the club was busy maintaining the groomers, all of which have been serviced for the upcoming season. The biggest project was replacing the tracks on the 1999 Piston Bully. One of the club's main priorities is to purchase another new Piston Bully to replace its oldest one, and grants are being sought toward that purchase. The club is hoping to get the brush cutter set up on the drags to keep tree limbs from encroaching upon the trails.

The annual poker run is tentatively scheduled for Saturday, February 14, and a Great North Woods Vintage Snowmobile Series race on February 21; the club is always looking for volunteers to help out during the vintage race. The annual steak feed takes place at the clubhouse on Saturday, March 7.





Enjoy Canada's Trails during Québec Open House Weekend, February 7-8

An initiative of the Fédération des Clubs de Motoneigistes du Québec (FCMQ) and its member clubs, the second annual Québec Open House weekend offers free access to a vast snowmobile trail network north of the border on February 7 and 8, 2015.

New in 2014, a temporary trail permit is required to participate in the open house weekend, but it will be provided free of charge. Details are still being worked out and will be posted on-line at www.fcmq.qc.ca (English version available) under "Events."

More than 32,000 kilometers of trails await those partaking in this two-day event, all accessible at no charge. As many will take advantage of this opportunity to become initiated with the joys of snowmobiling, the FCMQ wishes to remind everyone of the following rules:

• The owner of the snowmobile must hold a public liability insurance

Ride in N.H., Vt. & Maine on Tri-State Reciprocal Weekend

Riders can hit the trails in New Hampshire, Vermont and Maine during the annual Tri-State Reciprocal Snowmobile Weekend, this year taking place from Friday, January 30 to Sunday, February 1.

All snowmobiles legally registered in each state may operate on all three states' trails during the three-day open weekend. All other state laws and rules regarding the operation of snowmobiles must be adhered to, such as speed limits and youth operation standards, including Vermont's mandatory liability insurance, and safety card requirement for those born after July 1, 1983.

Complete information about snow-mobiling laws in each state may be found on-line, from the N.H. Fish & Game at www.wildlife.state.nh.us under "OHRV"; from the Vermont Association of Snow Travelers at www.vtvast.org; and from the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries & Wildlife, at www.maine.gov/ifw under "vehicles."




policy with a minimum coverage of \$500,000 and have proof of said insurance in his possession:

- All snowmobiles must be registered and licensed;
- The minimum age to operate a snowmobile is 16. In addition, drivers ages 16 and 17 must have a valid snowmobile operator's permit;
- It is forbidden to carry more passengers on a snowmobile than the capacity specified by the manufacturer:

Those wishing to take full advantage of Québec's trails beyond the open house weekend may purchase an annual or temporary trail permit. The purchase of a trail permit contributes to the maintenance, development and safety of the trail network, lending support to the volunteers of the FCMQ's member clubs.

Upon returning to the U.S., riders must present a passport or passport card at the port of entry. Those under age 16 may present only proof of citizenship, such as a birth certificate or Naturalization Certificate. Complete information about travel requirements is available from U.S. Customs and Border Protection, at www.cbp.gov.

The second annual Great North Woods Sled Dog Challenge will run through Milan, Pittsburg and Colebrook from January 17-19, with each town hosting a different stage of

The three-day event will kick off with a Meet the Mushers Banquet at the Mahoosic Inn in Milan, at 6 p.m. on Friday, January 16. The official race start is at 9 a.m. on Saturday morning, January 17, also at the Mahoosic Inn. On Sunday the mushers will compete in Pittsburg, and on Monday, January 19 the race will finish with a 45-mile loop that begins and ends at the Colebrook Country Club in Colebrook.

N.H. Fish & Game Offers Guidelines for Staying Safe while Snowmobiling

The New Hampshire Fish & Game Department, on-line at www.wildlife. state.nh.us, offers some commonsense guidelines to help riders stay safe while out on the trails.

Alcohol & Riding Do Not Mix

New Hampshire has strict laws against operating an OHRV while under the influence of alcohol or drugs. Alcohol increases fatigue, affects your fine and gross motor skills, affects your judgment and ability to make rational decisions, thus making it dangerous to operate a wheeled vehicle or snowmobile. Remember: if you must drink and ride, drink a soda.

Myth-buster: Many people believe in the myth that consuming alcohol can warm up a chilled person. This is not true. Alcohol opens the blood vessels and hides the sensation of being chilled by getting the warm blood close to the skin surface. It does noth-

ing to increase body heat. Instead, alcohol can cool your body down dangerously, increasing the risk of hypothermia.

Manage the Risk

Riding a recreational vehicle has inherent risks. The best way to avoid getting hurt or encountering problems while riding an OHRV is to manage these risks:

- Wear Protective Clothing. The most important piece of protective clothing you can wear is an approved helmet. Make sure the helmet has been approved by either Snell or DOT. If you have any questions about the condition of a used helmet, contact a competent dealer and ask their
- Know your abilities to ride and do not exceed those levels.
- · Identify the capabilities of the machine you are riding and do not exceed those levels.
- Always ride at a speed that is reasonable and prudent for the existing conditions. If you cannot control your machine, you are riding too fast, no matter what the posted speed limit is.
- Know the area you are riding in. Be aware of potential hazards such as washouts and other changing trail characteristics. Get a map of the trails and talk to local riders.
- Always keep an open mind to learning. You're never too old to learn. Take a class, join a club and ride with a friend.
- Use common sense when riding Be prepared; carry a first aid and survival kit. Take along some spare plugs and tools that may not be in the machine's tool kit.
- Let someone know where you will be riding and when you plan on returning. If you run into problems, these extra precautions can be timeand life-savers

Oldest Snowmobile Race in America Returns: Lancaster Grand Prix 2015

Lancaster, N.H., the town that wrote the first chapter in the book of motorized toboggan racing, will look to repeat the enormous success of last year's 50th reunion race with a return of the Lancaster Grand Prix, taking place from January 30 to February 1 at the fairgrounds

Last February, for the first time in 37 years since the last historic race in 1977, the prized Kilkenny Cup had a new list of names added to its already star-studded base. Some of the competitors who took their first look Saturday morning before they began "hot laps" on the quarter-mile oval, laden with a twofoot-thick ribbon of blue ice, asked race chairman Shane Beattie if a zamboni had been used.

After the snow dust settled on the final race Sunday, this new batch of winter warriors promised to return with even more sleds, and Mr. Beattie vowed that the 2015 track will be bigger and better. He has taken the sharpness out of the corners, so these high-speed ice machines could very well break the 100-m.p.h. barrier for the first time last year the 800s were clocked at 96 m.p.h. coming off the back stretch. The Lancaster Snow Drifters-the oldest

snowmobile club in the world—and the Town of Lancaster, with the help of hundreds of volunteers, will be hard at work right up until race time, getting this event ready for the fans.

Wednesday, January 14, 2015

It all begins with a huge vintage snowmobile show at Crane's Snowmobile Museum on Friday morning, January 30. Admission is free and the museum is open from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Friday evening brings the Grand Prix Ball starting at 5:30 p.m. at the Mountain View Grand Hotel in Whitefield, with dinner, a cash bar, music and dancing until 11 p.m.

Then it's two days of racing at the Lancaster Fairgrounds, with gates open at 7 a.m. and action on the track starting at 9 a.m. both days. Daily general admission costs \$10 per adult, free for kids ages 12 and under, and there will be food concessions, displays and vendors on site.


Post-race fun on Saturday includes a Sled Parade down Lancaster's Main Street, followed by a bonfire. The final event on Sunday is the prestigious Kilkenny Cup race, which will provide the highest payout of the weekend. This year's Grand Prix is boasting a \$10,000

about one of his Ski-Doos. He said he had something for trade, and Mr. Crane went up there to see the Boggana, which he had never heard

They made a deal and Mr. Crane brought the sled back to New Hampshire, at which point he did more research into it. Eventually he discovered that the creator of the Boggana was still alive and living in Canada. He reached out to him and received a letter from the maker, who said Mr. Crane's Boggana was one of the first two that were ever made because it had a hand-made suspen-

Along with the snowmobiles, there are also numerous vintage signs and other snowmobiling artifacts. Mr. Crane said the only other museum like his is the New Hampshire Snowmobile Museum in Allenstown, but observed, "Everyone who has been in here says there is no comparison," adding that each machine in his museum is unique.

Crane's Snowmobile Museum is in Lancaster, just off of Main Street next to Bond Auto, and is accessible by sled via Trail 5. The museum is usually open during the day from Friday



offers a look at the evolution of riding through the years,

from the Ski-Doo machines first introduced in the 1960s, to the newer sleds of today

Inside the museum are about 85 different snowmobiles with no duplications, and curator Paul Crane says he has another 40 unique machines in storage. Throughout the museum are machines from companies still in operation, such as Ski-Doo and Arctic Cat. and those from manufacturers of vesteryear, including Moto-Ski-later bought by Bombardier—and Rupp.

Mr. Crane has enjoyed a long relationship with snowmobiling, starting 1959 when he worked for Timberland Machines in Lancaster, an independent distributor of Ski-Doo snowmobiles. He and president Bob Bottoms visited the Ski-Doo factory in Valcourt, Québec, and met with founder Joseph-Armand Bombardier.

"Bob and Mr. Bombardier were standing right there and I rode the prototype, whose cab was made out

Paul said. "They put trailer tires on the skids and I rode it right down Valcourt Street." That year Timberland sold the 1960 model machines, with a price tag of \$1,050.

Three 1961 model Ski-Doos are part of the collection at Crane's Snowmobile Museum, and one with a tin cab sits next to Mr. Crane's desk at the front. He later started his own sporting goods store in Lancaster, selling Ski-Doo and Polaris gear.

Mr. Crane started the museum about five years ago and said he wanted to showcase the major changes that the snowmobiles have gone through. He has bought the majority of sleds in the museum, including some from locations like Minnesota and Wisconsin

"I've only had two sleds donated to me for display in the museum," he said, noting that others were given for parts. "I bought all the rest except the ones I had when I sold them." The maiority of the machines are in original condition: 11 were reconditioned and the rest required nothing more than a little polishing

There are far too many machines to mention them all, but the display includes a 1972 Ski-Doo Elite, the first side-by-side model produced, one of only twenty 1971 Northway racing sleds produced, a 1963 Trail Bike combination bike and sled with a serial number of "4," a 1962 Fox-Trac prototype, and a First-Aid Sno-Cruiser Emergency Unit, a trailer that can be attached to any sled to transport injured people. He also has a 1967 Scat Mobile, and the founder donated the first Scat Mobile sign he ever made, which now hangs in the museum.

He has the first "Blue Goose," one of fewer than 50 made by the Kettle Aircraft Company. Mr. Crane said it came from Michigan, and took him nine years to find. He also has a 1926 Model T that he bought from the Kopp family of North Country Ford, which they had originally purchased

The machines haven't always been easy to get. Mr. Crane had his eye on a 1969 Sno Coupe that he saw at a vintage snowmobile show in Flint, Michigan. It took three tries before he was able to buy it.

During a tour of his museum he pointed out what he calls his "pride and joy," a custom-built Boggana snowmobile built in the late 1950s in

Frequently Asked Questions about Snowmobiling in New Hampshire

The N.H. Fish and Game Department enforces laws on the state's snowmobile trails, and provides the following answers to frequently asked questions about OHRV laws.

Who has to register their OHRV? All OHRVs that are used off of the owner's property must be registered.

Where can I register?

Registrations can be made in person at more than 200 OHRV registration agencies located throughout the state. Visit www.wildlife.state.nh.us for a complete listing of N.H. OHRV agents. Businesses that sell OHRV Registrations include OHRV sales and repair shops, sporting goods stores, country and general stores and some marinas. Registrations are also available by mail; call 603-271-3422.

Do I need a driver's license to operate an OHRV?

You cannot operate any OHRV if your driver's license is under suspension or revocation in any state or Canadian Province. An OHRV Safety Education Certificate does not override a vehicle license suspension. A

CITGO Gas

valid motor vehicle driver's license or OHRV Safety Education Certificate is also required to cross a public way.

Any operator 12 years of age and over must show proof of an approved safety education class or possess a valid motor vehicle driver's license Any operator under the age of 14 must be accompanied by a licensed adult over the age of 18. Any operator under the age of 12 cannot cross roads. Any operator under the age of 18 must wear a helmet and eye protection, and any passenger under the age of 18 must wear a helmet.

Where can I ride?

More than 6,900 miles of snowmobile trails may be open in the winter to most types of snowmobiles and OHRVs. Landowner permission is required to operate on property of another, and you may ride only on trails designated and signed for your type of vehicle. Snowmobile trails are open only during the winter months unless written landowner permission is obtained. The N.H. Bureau of Trails and the New Hampshire Snowmobile Association statewide Snowmobile Trail maps; local trail maps are printed and distributed by local clubs.

Can I ride beneath power lines and other utility company rights of way?

A majority of land on which the utility companies operate are private property. The companies obtain easements for their purposes only. Written landowner permission from each individual landowner must be obtained if the trail is not specifically designated for OHRV use before you can operate your OHRV.

Vermont Snowmobiling Laws (Continued From Page 20)

SWI on the VAST system, intoxicated snowmobilers operating on a public highway will be charged with DWI. As a result of this violation, they will be assessed points and their driver's license will be suspended.

· A frozen lake is considered a public highway and the maximum speed limit is 50 m.p.h.

• Accident Reporting: If you are involved in an accident, resulting in personal injury, death or property damage in excess of \$500, it is your duty to stop and report it to local authorities. You must give your name. address, registration number and the name of the owner of the snowmobile to the party whose person or property is injured. You must also file an accident report with the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles within 72 hours.

• Equipment Requirements: Snowmobiles must be equipped with a headlight; red rear light; windshield free from jagged or sharp edges; a fully functional brake in good condition; efficient muffler and such other equipment and devices as may be required to meet the noise level specifications of not more than 73 decibels on the "A" scale at 50 feet in a

normal operating environment. Colored lens covers on headlights are illegal. Windshields are mandatory, or the operator must wear eye glasses, goggles or a protective face shield. Helmets are mandatory for all riders on the VAST trail system.

• It is against Vermont law to sell a replacement exhaust system that exceeds the manufacturer's original equipment specifications. Violation of this law will result in a fine of \$300 for the snowmobile operator and a \$300 fine for the person selling the illegal exhaust system. No by-pass of a muffler system is allowed.

Laws & Rules for Snowmobiling in VT

• Under Vermont Title 23, Chapter

29, riders must operate their snowmobiles at a speed that is reasonable and prudent, taking into consideration current conditions, trail traffic and

• The maximum speed limit on state lands is 35 miles per hour. The use of radar on snowmobile trails is becoming a standard practice. With the use of hand-held radar guns, the enforcement of speed limits that are imposed on all state lands has increased dramatically. Snowmobiles are subject to posted speed limits on public roads

• Vermont has a tough "Snowmobiling While Intoxicated" law that covers both drugs and alcohol. While riders will be charged with

Is it illegal to operate while under the influence of alcohol or drugs? Operating an OHRV while under

the influence of alcohol or drugs is illegal and extremely dangerous. Nationwide, approximately 65 percent of OHRV fatal crashes involve an intoxicated operator. The same laws and penalties for operating motor vehicles while under the influence apply to OHRVs including implied consent, hefty fines, jail time and loss of your driving privileges. The legal blood alcohol concentration limit for operating an OHRVs is similar to motor vehicle, .08 percent, or attempting to operate while impaired.

Is my New Hampshire registration valid in other states?

Your New Hampshire snowmobile registration is valid in Vermont, but you must purchase a Non-Resident Trails Maintenance Assessment Pass and join the state association and local club. Some states and provinces

When planning to ride in other states or provinces, call ahead for particulars and restrictions such as dates and available trails. See page 5 for information on the Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine reciprocal riding weekend.

How much of my snowmobile or ATV registration fee stays at Fish and Game?

Only part of the state's OHRV registration revenue goes to Fish and Game. The N.H. Bureau of Trails receives a majority of the funds: 82 percent of the snowmobile registration monies and 57 percent of the wheeled-vehicle registration monies. The remainder stays at Fish and Game as dedicated funds used for the OHRV Registry Program, Snowmobile and OHRV Safety Education Program, providing law enforcement for snowmobile and ATV trails.

Bogie Wheel; complete race rules and registration are available on-line.


